The Urban Land Conservancy acquires, preserves, and develops real estate to under-served areas for long-term community benefit in the greater Denver and Front Range area. Through the acquisition, development and preservation of real estate in urban areas, they help communities meet infrastructure needs such as schools, affordable housing, community centers and nonprofit facility space. Though its practices resemble those of both land banks and community land trusts, the ULC is in other ways a very different kind of real estate organization. Aaron Miripol, President and CEO of the Urban Land Conservancy, will share ULC's real estate model, and how it leverages partnerships with public, private and nonprofit organizations to preserve and build community assets - including affordable housing. *Moderated by Sarah Lucas, Housing North*.

#### 1:30 LAND BANK AUTHORITIES: LEVERAGING LAND & LOCAL TOOLS FOR HOUSING

Land bank authorities are organized at the county level to deal with tax foreclosures, and come with important legal and financial tools available to get land back into private ownership and on the tax rolls – from demolishing blighted buildings, to cleaning up contamination, to the purchase, sale, and management of property, to partnerships with private or nonprofit developers. Jim Tischler of the Michigan Land Bank Authority will share information about how land bank authorities are organized, the tools available to them, and how counties throughout Michigan are using them in partnership with local governments and nonprofits to meet local goals. *Moderated by Chip Hansen, Charlevoix County Community Foundation.*
