What Kind of Polls Are We Talking About?

 Traditional phone surveys w/ live professional interviewers (Mostly cell phones, but there are still landlines out there)

Hybrid sampling (phones, text and online)

Online surveys / ad testing



Benchmark Surveys

- Is this issue/ race worth engaging
- What will it take to win?
- Longer, in depth survey testing mood, issue environment and message
- 12 to 15 minutes in length



Tracking or Viability Survey

- Shorter survey with more limited objectives
- Test attitudinal movement
- Produce quick information or talking points

10 minutes or less



Four Primary Strategic Functions:

- To Educate (internally)
- To Inform (externally)

To Educate (Internally)

- What do people know about an issue or candidate?
- Is this a viable campaign?
- What would it take to win (message/ targets/ budget)?



To Inform (Externally)

- Provide information to the public

- Can People be persuaded?
- Determine message what do we say and who do we say it to?

Survey Methodology

American Strategies designed and administered this multimodal survey conducted by professional interviewers and via Qualtrics. The survey reached 818 adults, age 18 or older, who indicated they were registered to vote in Joetown, Anystate and were likely to vote in the upcoming Midterm Elections. The survey was conducted September 6-13, 2022.

Forty-five percent of respondents were reached on wireless phones, three percent on VOIP phones, and eight percent on landlines. Forty-five percent of respondents were reached online. Quotas were assigned to reflect the demographic distribution of likely November 2022 voters in Joetown, Anystate, and the data were weighted to ensure an accurate reflection of the population. The sample was drawn from a third-party vendor file. The overall margin of error is +/- 3.4%. The margin of error for subgroups is larger and varies. Percentage totals may not add up precisely due to rounding.

Survey Methodology

American Strategies designed and administered this multi-modal survey conducted by professional interviewers and via Qualtrics. The survey reached 777 adults (700 Weighted), age 18 or older, who indicated they were registered to vote in Homestate and were almost certain to vote, would probably vote, or had a 50-50 chance of voting in the November 2022 election for Homestate governor and other offices. The survey was conducted from February 8-14, 2022.

Sixty percent of respondents were reached on wireless phones, eight percent on VOIP phones, ten percent on landlines, and 21 percent online. Quotas were assigned to reflect the demographic distribution of likely November 2022 General Election Homestate voters, and the data were weighted to ensure an accurate reflection of the likely voter population. The sample was drawn from a third-party vendor voter file and based on vote history. The overall margin of error is +/- 3.7%. The margin of error for subgroups is larger and varies. Percentage totals may not add up precisely due to rounding.
